Meet Officer Beatus Swai

Officer Beatus Swai joined the Clyde Hill Police Department on 3/1/2019. Previously, he was an Officer with the Murphy Police Dept. in Texas for five years, the UNC Chapel Hill Police Department in North Carolina for six years, and the University of Southern Maine in Portland and Gorham Police Department for five and a half years.

Officer Swai's most recent assignment with the Murphy Police Department was Patrol, where he received the Officer of the Year award in 2016. His previous assignments in North Carolina included Criminal Investigations Sergeant, Patrol Sergeant, and Patrol, where he was also awarded Officer of the Year in 2012 and 2013. Born and raised in Tanzania, Officer Swai now resides in Bothell with his wife and two sons.

Summer Construction Projects

The City of Bellevue Water Dept. will be constructing a new water main and hydrants on 32nd St,34nd St, and 35th St starting at 96th Ave and continuing east into Bellevue. Project specifics and notification wil come from the City of Bellevue. The project is expected to continue through the end of the year.

Clyde Hill Public Works has two storm drainage repair and upgrade projects being put out to bid in August; it has an expected start date in September.

These projects are relatively small in scope and should cause minimal impacts to traffic. One project is a pipe rehabilitation project in Aqua Vista, the other is a flow splitter catchment that diverts heavy storm flows into two pipe systems on 87th Place. Both projects are expected to be complete by mid November.

Notices will be sent out to affected residents by the City before the project begins.



Correction to Previous Article: Washington State's Real Estate Excise Tax Increase

The May *Clyde Hill Views Newsletter* contained an error about the new real estate excise tax increase imposed by the State.

The tax rate is graduated; the example calculation provided didn't reflect that. The correct amount paid to the state will be \$51,300 on a \$2.7 million home. Clyde Hill will still receive the same amount next year—a flat 0.5%. The additional revenue will go to the Education Legacy Trust Account.

Limited Parking of Boats, Trailers and RVs in the City

You may not have thought about it, but one of the many reasons that Clyde Hill is such a beautiful place to live is due of the rules regarding parking of recreational vehicles and trailers.



Remember that you cannot park or store any boat, RV or trailer on your property unless it is wholly enclosed within a garage, or it is completely and legally screened from view. These types of vehi-
