The ever popular annual clean-up event will be here soon!



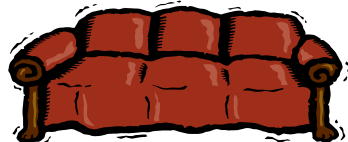

Items you **MAY NOT** put out include: automotive parts, construction debris, hazardous wastes (such as paint and pesticides), chemicals, large appliances (such as refrigerators), liquid wastes, electronics and tires. See the article below for information about managing household hazardous waste.

How to get an Officer Response

If you need a police officer—at any time—for any reason—**dial 911**.

Calling 911 is the only way to get an officer dispatched. To report suspicious activity or any issue requiring the police, dial 911.

Hazardous Waste Management Program

If you live in King County, you can take your household hazardous waste to any of four collection sites or drop it off at the traveling Wastemobile. You don't need to make an appointment, and there is no fee for this service. Wastes collected at these sites will be recycled or disposed of properly.

Pet Waste and the Environment

Most of us pick up after our pets in order to be a good neighbor and to keep our yard clean. But there is another important reason to clean up after our pets: pet waste contains bacteria that is harmful to our water and unsafe for humans. Leaving it on the sidewalk or in a yard means that harmful bacteria can get washed into storm drains and roadside ditches. Many of these flow directly into our lakes and rivers untreated and make swimming and other recreational activities unsafe.



What can you do?

Whether in your yard or on a walk, dispose of your pet's waste promptly in the trash or toilet to prevent it from entering storm drains and roadside ditches.

Pick up after your pet to help keep our City beautiful and our water clean!

Beware the Leyland Cypress!

Many homeowners wish to plant a hedge or border plant that is quick growing. Leyland cypress grow extremely quickly but they pose other problems in our City.

Their phenomenal growth rate means that, in order to maintain them as a hedge, they must be pruned 2 to 3 times per year. If they become overgrown and you decide to top them, they grow with redoubled effort rapidly become even bigger than they were before.

The City continually fields complaints about overgrown hedges and trees. We heartily discourage anyone from choosing this plant for their landscape. Good alternatives are:

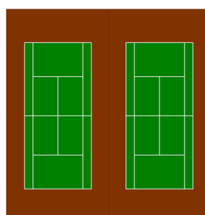
- Emerald green arborvitae (Thuja occidentalis 'Smaragd')
- H.M. Eddie yew (Taxus x media 'H.M. Eddie')
- Boxwood (Buxus, various species)

Storm Drains

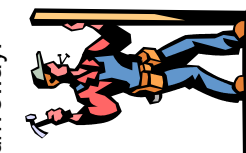


Storm drains serve an important function: to prevent flooding and property damage. Please remove any debris that collects on the drains near your home.

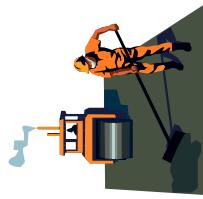
Do not put anything into the storm drain other than rain; this includes soaps or chemicals of any kind. The City's storm drains flow right into Lake Washington.
